Course Description

In Introduction to Global Culture, the student will be introduced to past and contemporary debates over what it means to be a part of an interconnected and globalized world. We will explore complex matters such as global v. local tensions and relationships; neoliberalism and neocolonialism; cultural productions and their impact; North-South connections; and a variety of fundamental topics such as arts, sports, economics, entertainment, and more.

This course aims at providing students with a variety of tools to critically tackle important questions that arise at the core of the social phenomenon we call globalization. But it also hopes to entice students and broaden their interests by exposing them to a wide array of authors, artists, and cultural productions outside a West-centered axis. Materials examined will include music, films, video games, visual arts and more.

Learning Outcomes

The student will gain insight into the power imbalances behind the globalization structure. By the end of the course, the student will have explored different topics and media through a variety of assignments designed to improve their writing and communication skills, media literacy, creativity, and autonomy.

Course Materials

Students are not required to buy any materials for this course. All readings and tools will be provided in Teams and OWL.

Methods of Evaluation

30% LABS: PROMPTS AND ACTIVITIES

Activities carried out in Teams or OWL during class. There will be 6 prompts total (around 300 words each). LABS must demonstrate meaningful engagement with the course's themes and materials.

35% QUIZZES

<mark>Two online quizzes</mark> each with 30 multiple-choice questions. Quiz #1 will cover <mark>weeks 2 to 7.</mark> Quiz #2 will cover <mark>weeks 8 to 10</mark>.

35% FINAL EXAM

For this exam, students will write a 1,000-word response to TWO out of THREE questions posted in OWL (around 2,000 words total). Students will have 3 hours to complete the exam. You are free to consult texts, online lectures, notes, and all course materials.

Student Code of Conduct

Prerequisite and Antirequisite Information

Students are responsible for ensuring that they have successfully completed all course prerequisites and that they have not completed any course antirequisites. Unless you have either the requisites for this course or written special permission from your Dean to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. This decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

Attendance Regulations for Examinations

Statement on Use of Electronic Devices

It is not appropriate to use electronic devices (such as, but not limited to, laptops, tablets, cell phones) in the classroom for non-classroom activities. Such activity is disruptive and distracting to other students and to the instructor, and can inhibit learning. Students are expected to respect the classroom environment and to refrain from inappropriate use of technology and other electronic devices in class.

Statement on Use of Personal Response Systems ("Clickers")

Personal Response Systems ("clickers") may be used in some classes. If clickers are to be used in a class, it is the responsibility of the student to ensure that the device is activated and functional. Students must see their instructor if they have any concerns about whether the clicker is malfunctioning. Students must use only their own clicker. If clicker records are used to compute a portion of the course grade:

- the use of somebody else's clicker in class constitutes a scholastic offence
- the possession of a clicker belonging to another student will be interpreted as an attempt to commit a scholastic offence.

Academic Consideration for Missed Work

All students pursuing academic consideration, regardless of type, must contact their instructors no less than 24 hours following the end of the period of absence to clarify how they will be expected to fulfill the academic responsibilities missed during their absence. **Students are reminded that they should consider carefully the implications of postponing tests or midterm exams or delaying submission of work, and are encouraged to make appropriate decisions based on their specific circumstances.**

Policy on Academic Consideration for a Medical/Non-Medical Absence

(a) Consideration on <u>Medical Grounds</u> for assignments worth *less than 10%* of final grade: Consult Instructor Directly and Contact Academic Advising

When seeking consideration on **medical grounds** for assignments worth *less than 10%* of the final course grade, the student should contact the instructor directly. The student need only share broad outlines of the medical situation. The instructor **may** require the student to submit documentation to the academic advisors, in which case she or he will advise the student and inform the academic

advisors to expect documentation. If documentation is requested, the student will need to complete and submit the <u>Student Medical Certificate</u>. The instructor may <u>not</u> collect medical documentation. The advisors will contact the instructor when the medical documentation is received, and will outline the severity and duration of the medical challenge as expressed on the Student Medical Certificate and in any other supporting documentation. The student will be informed that the instructor has been notified of the presence of medical documentation, and will be instructed to work as quickly as possible with the instructor on an agreement for accommodation.

b) <u>Medical Grounds</u> for assignments <u>worth 10% or more of final grade</u>: Go Directly to Academic Advising

University Senate policy, which can be found at <u>Academic Calendar - Western University (uwo.ca)</u> requires that all student requests for accommodation on medical grounds for assignments worth 10% or more of the final grade be made directly to the academic advising office of the home faculty (for Huron students, the "home faculty" is Huron), with supporting documentation in the form (minimally) of the Senate-approved Student Medical Certificate found at: <u>https://www.uwo.ca/univsec/pdf/academic_policies/appeals/medicalform.pdf</u>.

The documentation is submitted in confidence and will not be shown to instructors. The advisors will contact the instructor when the medical documentation is received, and will outline the severity and duration of the medical challenge as expressed on the Student Medical Certificate and in any other supporting documentation. The student will be informed that the instructor has been notified of the presence of medical documentation, and will be instructed to work as quickly as possible with the instructor on an agreement for accommodation. The instructor will not normally deny accommodation where appropriate medical documentation is in place and where the duration it describes aligns with the due date(s) of assignment(s). Before denying a request for accommodation on medical grounds, the instructor will consult with the Dean. The instructor's decision is appealable to the Dean.

<u>c)</u> Consideration on <u>Non-Medical</u> Grounds: Consult Huron Support Services/Academic Advising, or email <u>huronsss@uwo.ca</u>.

Students seeking academic consideration for a **non-medical** absence (e.g. varsity sports, religious, compassionate, or bereavement) will be required to provide appropriate documentation. All consideration requests must include a completed <u>Consideration Request Form</u>. Late penalties may apply at the discretion of the instructor.
