Course Description:

This course introduces students to the literary theory of ecocriticism and explores the representation of nature and environment in Chinese literature and film in contemporary era of industrialization, modernization, and urbanization. The course focuses particularly on the relationship that various Chinese communities have with the natural world and the influence of politics, ethnicity, gender, class on such relationship. The course is taught in Chinese.

Learning Objectives:

By the end of this course, students will be able to

- Outline the major developments in ecocriticism in Chinese literary and cultural studies;
- Identify some important writers, film directors, and their works that explore the environmental issues and raise public awareness about eco problems in China;
- Understand social, political, economic factors that influence environment through the lens of literary and visual representation;
- Develop analytical skills and critical thinking abilities in studying Chinese literature and film from the perspective of ecocriticism.

Textbooks and Other Required Resources:

Readings and films will be provided on OWL course website.

Class Methods:

Classes are usually composed of a lecture and an asynchronous session.

Attendance and Participation

Attendance and participation do not simply mean that you attend all classes, coming to class

on time and staying until the end. It is most important that you read the texts and come to class prepared. You must actively participate in the discussion and interact with the instructor and your fellow students.

One component of participation includes yours posting on the forum at OWL. The forum posting involve finding texts, then posting what you have found/made and writing and posting a short commentary about it in relation to the course content. The "text" can be an essay, a book chapter, an excerpt from any form of a literary work (fiction, poem, etc,), or a short video clip. It could be either the readings from this course or external sources you find by yourself. Once you have selected and posted your text, I then want you to add a paragraph or two of your reflections on it and on its relevance to the issue/subject assigned.)

Asynchronous session

In asynchronous sessions you are required to watch the assigned movie to prepare for the next class. Please refer to the schedule of class for details.

Tests

The mid-term test will take place in class on **May 27.** It is two hours in length and covers lectures and readings in the past sessions. You will choose two consecutive hours from the 24-hour window on that day to finish the exam. The final exam will be scheduled during the exam period. It will cover lectures and readings after the mid-term test. Exam format will be given in class prior to the exam.

Term Paper and Proposal

Students will write a research paper of at least 3000 words. Please provide a word count at the end of your paper. You must consult scholarly books and articles and not limit your research to Internet sources. All the primary and secondary sources must be appropriately cited in the paper and listed in your bibliography in given format. No form of plagiarism or academic dishonesty will be tolerated. The paper should be typewritten and double-spaced with a clearly defined thesis statement supported by relevant evidence. The electronic copy of the essay must be uploaded to OWL on **June 12.** Specific instructions for the term paper and proposal will be provided in class.

Special Instructions:

There is a penalty for late submission of the term paper. Penalty is 10% for each calendar day to a total of three days.

Personal Response Systems ("clickers") may be used in some classes. If clicker records are used to compute a portion of the course grade:

- the use of somebody else's clicker in class constitutes a scholastic offence

Academic Consideration for Missed Work

Students who are seeking academic consideration for missed work during the semester may submit a self-reported absence form online provided that the absence is **48 hours or less** and the other conditions specified in the Senate policy at

Students whose absences are expected to last **longer than 48 hours**, or where the other conditions detailed in the policy are not met (e.g., work is worth more than 30% of the final grade, the student has already used 2 self-reported absences, the absence is during the final exam period), may receive academic consideration by submitting a Student Medical Certificate (for illness) or other appropriate documentation (for compassionate grounds). The Student Medical Certificate is available online at https://www.uwo.ca/univsec/pdf/academic_policies/appeals/medicalform.pdf.

All students pursuing academic consideration, regardless of type, must contact their instructors no less than 24 hours following the end of the period of absence to clarify how they will be expected to fulfill the academic responsibilities missed during their absence. Students are reminded that they should consider carefully the implications of postponing tests or midterm exams or delaying submission of work, and are encouraged to make appropriate decisions based on their specific circumstances.

Students who have conditions for which academic accommodation is appropriate, such as disabilities or ongoing or chronic health conditions, should work with Accessible Education Services to determine appropriate forms of accommodation. Policy on Academic Consideration for a Medical/ Non-Medical Absence

(a) Consideration on <u>Medical Grounds</u> for assignments worth *less than 10%* of final grade: Consult Instructor Directly and Contact Academic Advising

When seeking consideration on **medical grounds** for assignments worth *less than 10%* of the final course grade, and if the student has exceeded the maximum number of permissible Self-Reported absences, the student should contact the instructor directly. The student need only share broad outlines of the medical situation. The instructor **may** require the student to submit documentation to the academic advisors, in which case she or he will advise the student and inform the academic advisors to expect documentation. If documentation is requested, the student will need to complete and submit the <u>Student Medical Certificate</u>. The instructor may <u>not</u> collect medical documentation. The advisors will contact the instructor when the medical documentation is received, and will outline the severity and duration of the medical challenge as expressed on the Student Medical Certificate and in any other supporting documentation. The student will be informed that the instructor has been notified of the presence of medical documentation, and will be instructed to work as quickly as possible with the instructor on an agreement for accommodation.

(b) Consideration on <u>Non-Medical</u> Grounds: Consult Huron Support Services/Academic Advising, or email <u>huronsss@uwo.ca</u>.

Students seeking academic consideration for a **non-medical** absence (e.g. varsity sports, religious, compassionate, or bereavement) will be required to provide appropriate documentation where the conditions for a Self-Reported Absence have not been met, including where the student has exceeded the maximum number of permissible Self-Reported. All consideration requests must include a completed <u>Consideration Request Form</u>. Late penalties may apply at the discretion of the instructor.
