Macroeconomics 2221B 550 Spring 2023 Intersession II; June 5 – June 26

Instructor: D. McKeon

Course Description.

This is the second course in the intermediate macroeconomic theory sequence. The main goal of the course is to use the model constructed in the first course to analyze open economy issues, business cycles, monetary and fiscal policy and growth.

Learning Objectives

- Students will learn the intellectual heritage of various models in macroeconomics and why, or why not, aspects of these models are still used.
- Students will be able make sense of current events from a macroeconomic policy perspective.
- Student will gain valuable analytical skills by using models express ideas rather than solely as mechanical devices to calculate answers.
- Students will discover what professional economists do in the course of their day to day careers.

Textbook. Abel, Bernanke and Kneebone, <u>Macroeconomics (nineth Canadian edition)</u> Pearson 2022 (you can also use the 7^{th} or 8^{th} edition). There will also be an OWL site where additional material will be posted.

Supplementary text: Williamson, Macroeconomics (6th Canadian edition) Addison Wesley – 2017. It is **NOT NECESSARY t**o purchase this book.

The course will be taught entirely online. All lectures will appear on a weekly basis just as if we were in a classroom. You are expected to <u>"attend"</u> every lecture in its entirety by watching the recorded lectures. Questions on quizzes or tests may be based on topics covered in the lectures. Not all topics are covered in the textbook.

Participation assignments and quizzes must be completed on the date announced. There are no makeups for missed participation assessments. There will be no makeup assignments given. To repeat. The purpose of participation is student engagement with the material. There will be **<u>NO MAKEUPS</u>** for missed participation assessments or assignments.

<u>No makeup tests will be given.</u> A student who misses a test must provide documentation to the counseling office (not the professor) and if this documentation is

All class participants are required to attend the virtual classes.

The course is **entirely asynchronous.** But I plan to have a "**live**" **Zoom** session every Wednesday morning from 10AM -11 AM London Ontario time. This time slot, like all things related to this course, is tentative.

You are **NOT** required to come to the Wednesday Zoom session. The purpose of this session is to answer questions about the **ACTUAL course material** or **the financial markets policy decisions** or current **exogenous events** that have an effect on the macro-economy.

These sessions are not meant for going over quizzes or tests. Although assessments are necessary, the main purpose of this course is to learn basic macroeconomics. I treat tests as necessary, but not the prime reason we are in university.

- 1) A student may be debarred from writing the final examination for failure to maintain satisfactory academic standing throughout the year.
- 2) Any student who, in the opinion of the instructor, is absent too frequently from class or laboratory periods in any course will be reported to the Dean of the Faculty offering the course (after due warning has been given). Statement on Use of Electronic Devices

It is not appropriate to use electronic devices (such as, but not limited to, laptops, cell phones) in the classroom for non-classroom activities. Such activity is disruptive and distracting to other students and to the instructor, and can inhibit learning. Students are expected to respect the classroom environment and to refrain from inappropriate use of technology and other electronic devices in class.

Statement on Use of Personal Response Systems ("Clickers")

Personal Response Systems ("clickers") may be used in some classes. If clickers are to be used in a class, it is the responsibility of the student to ensure that the device is activated and functional. Students must see their instructor if they have any concerns about whether the clicker is malfunctioning. Students must use only their own clicker. If clicker records are used to compute a portion of the course grade:

- the use of somebody else's clicker in class constitutes a scholastic offence
- the possession of a clicker belonging to another student will be interpreted as an attempt to commit a scholastic offence.

Academic Consideration for Missed Work

Students who are seeking academic consideration for missed work during the semester may submit a self-reported absence form online provided that the absence is **48 hours or less** and the other conditions specified in the Senate policy at

Students whose absences are expected to last **longer than 48 hours**, or where the other conditions detailed in the policy are not met (e.g., work is worth more than 30% of the final grade, the student has already used 2 self-reported absences, the absence is during the final exam period), may receive academic consideration by submitting a Student Medical Certificate (for illness) or other appropriate documentation (for compassionate grounds). All students pursuing academic consideration, regardless of type, must contact their instructors no less than 24 hours following the end of the period of absence to clarify how they will be expected to fulfill the academic responsibilities missed during their absence. **Students are reminded that they should consider carefully the implications of postponing tests or midterm exams or delaying submission of work, and are encouraged to make appropriate decisions based on their specific circumstances.**

Students who have conditions for which academic accommodation is appropriate, such as disabilities or ongoing or chronic health conditions, should work with Accessible Education Services to determine appropriate forms of accommodation. Policy on Academic Consideration for a Medical/ Non-Medical Absence

(a) Consideration on <u>Medical Grounds</u> for assignments worth *less than 10%* of final grade: Consult Instructor Directly and Contact Academic Advising

When seeking consideration on **medical grounds** for assignments worth *less than 10%* of the final course grade, and if the student has exceeded the maximum number of permissible Self-Reported absences, the student should contact the instructor directly. The student need only share broad outlines of the medical situation. The instructor **may** require the student to submit documentation to the academic advisors, in which case she or he will advise the student and inform the academic advisors to expect documentation. If documentation is requested, the student will need to complete and submit the <u>Student Medical Certificate</u>. The instructor may <u>not</u> collect medical documentation. The advisors will contact the instructor when the medical documentation is received, and will outline the severity and duration of the medical challenge as expressed on the Student Medical Certificate and in any other supporting documentation. The student will be informed that the instructor has been notified of the presence of medical documentation, and will be instructed to work as quickly as possible with the instructor on an agreement for accommodation.

(b) Consideration on <u>Non-Medical</u> Grounds: Consult Huron Support Services/Academic Advising, or email <u>huronsss@uwo.ca</u>.

Students seeking academic consideration for a **non-medical** absence (e.g. varsity sports, religious, compassionate, or bereavement) will be required to provide appropriate documentation where the conditions for a Self-Reported Absence have not been met, including where the student has exceeded the maximum number of permissible Self-Reported. All consideration requests must include a completed <u>Consideration Request Form</u>. Late penalties may apply at the discretion of the instructor.
