2. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course covers the history, methodology, and content of the study of personality and individual differences. Topics that will be covered in the course include an introduction to personality theories, an examination of frequently studied personality and individual difference variables, and a consideration of current research and assessment methods.

3. COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

Throughout the course, students will develop knowledge, understanding, and the ability to critically evaluate personality-relevant material:

- ✓ PERSONALITY THEORIES: By the end of this course students will be able to discuss, compare, and critically examine major personality theories and how they were developed, as well as how they are relevant to modern society and social concerns.
- ✓ PERSONALITY TRAITS: By the end of this course students will understand and be able to compare and contrast commonly assessed personality traits and individual difference variables, and will also be able to discuss intrapersonal and interpersonal outcomes associated with these variables.
- ✓ PERSONALITY RESEARCH: By the end of the course students will have a comprehensive understanding of how personality research in psychology is conducted, and be able to compare various personality assessment methods and personality-relevant research designs.
- ✓ REAL WORLD APPLICATIONS: By the end of this course students will be able to understand how classroom material applies to real world outcomes and how classroom material connects to life experiences.

4. DESCRIPTION OF CLASS METHODS

LECTURES: The course format will consist of live online lectures (i.e., synchronous lectures) hosted every week on Mondays and Wednesdays via Zoom. Lectures will run from 1:30 – 4:30pm EDT.

Zoom is a video conferencing service supported by Western University; therefore, every Western student has free access. Before each class, I will post a Zoom link on OWL Brightspace, and students will click on that link to join the Zoom meeting and listen and participate in the lecture. There are no labs or tutorials. Zoom lectures will not be recorded.

Students at Huron University College should consider a grade in the range from 70-74 to be evidence of satisfactory performance in a 2100-level Psychology course. Grades in the B+ (75-79) or A (80-89%) ranges will only be awarded for performance that is demonstrably superior to the second-year standard associated with the Major or Minor modules. A grade of A+ (90-100%) will only be awarded very rarely and only for work that is truly exceptional.

Midterm Exam & Final Exam (Total Worth: 65%)

This course contains two exams: <u>Midterm Exam</u> & <u>Final Exam</u>. Both exams will be open-book, take-home format (i.e., asynchronous). Both exams will contain short-answer and long-answer questions. Both exams will cover the lecture units leading up to that exam session and are designed to be non-cumulative. Please note that take-home format exams are not considered traditional exams.

The Midterm Exam and Final Exam are designed to be completed in 3 hours or less, however I have provided an almost 24-hour window for students to complete the exams (e.g., to accommodate any time zone differences, work-life conflicts).

- (1) **Midterm Exam:** can be downloaded, worked on, and submitted between 12:00am and 11:55pm EDT on May 29, 2024.
- (2) **Final Exam:** check the Exam Schedule/Class Announcements for the date and time of the Final Exam.

Students who need to miss an exam due to medical or compassionate reasons should follow the appropriate accommodation procedures.

Due to recent advances in technology, written responses to exams can only contain information that comes from what was discussed during lectures, the lecture slides, and the course textbook. Outside information (i.e., information that does not come from lecture content or the textbook) cannot be used to answer exam questions. Exam questions must be completed independently and written using your own words (you will be asked to submit the exam through plagiarism software). Any violations will result in grading or other penalties.

Research Proposal Idea (Total Worth: 25%)

This Research Proposal Idea assignment is a brief (about 4 pages double-spaced) written exercise that gives students the opportunity to develop a research study idea in Personality Psychology. This exercise encourages students to start becoming creators of knowledge in psychology.

For the research proposal, students will be asked to come up with their own research study idea in Personality Psychology. Students will be asked to develop a research study idea using a personality variable of their choosing.

A research proposal rubric outlining the marking scheme will be provided to students. It is important that the research proposal is an original piece of writing and uses proper referencing/citations (you will be asked to submit the research proposal through plagiarism software).

Online Activities (Total Worth: 10%)

Online Activities (OAs) provide creative ways of engaging with topics discussed during each lecture (e.g., discussing the real-world applications of lecture content). Each OA is worth 2% of your total grade. For each OA, students will be given a brief task or discussion question, and they will be asked to write a short response.

Students are required to participate in **5 Online Activities** throughout the course (worth 2% each). You will therefore need to complete 5 out of 10 possible OAs. You can choose which OAs to participate in, however only the first five OAs that you submit will be graded. Nevertheless, after completing five OAs, you can submit *one* extra OA to replace your lowest scoring OA grade.

Please ensure you have properly completed five OAs before the end of term, as there are no make-up OAs. OAs will be graded (assigned a grade out of 2) according to the quality of the OA response and held to an appropriate average. A grading rubric will be provided to students.

An OA will be available on the course website before each lecture for Lectures 1 to 10. You will have until Friday night at 11:55pm of each week to complete the one or two assigned OAs associated with that week. Please make sure to submit your OA(s) on the course website before the deadline of 11:55pm every Friday.
