COURSE DELIVERY

Asynchronous 3 days/week, with synchronous classes taking place on Zoom on Wednesdays from 9:30 - 12:30.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course begins with the assumption that humans have moral duties and responsibilities toward one another. Given that assumption, what duties and responsibilities do they have when they are engaged in the production and transfer of goods and services, i.e., business. Some of the specific topics that will be discussed are: What is the purpose of the Modern Corporation? How are corporations and their individual members related in terms of moral responsibility? What responsibilities do corporations have to society at large? What is the ethical status of advertising?

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

The primary goal of this course is to help students improve their existing abilities to interpret and think critically about the materials they read. The primary means by which this goal will be accomplished are the lectures and the two essay assignments.

The second goal of this course is to introduce students to the ways in which the aforementioned skills have been applied to the ethical issues that arise in modern business practice. This goal will be accomplished by assessing students' understanding of these materials in our two tests and on the final exam.

CLASS METHODS

<u>80% Lecture</u> – The bulk of our class time will be devoted to ensuring that students understand the positions defended in the readings, and the issues to which those positions give rise. <u>20% Discussion</u> – Students are expected to attend our synchronous class having completed the scheduled readings from earlier in the week, prepared to discuss each.

REQUIRED TEXTS

All readings and lectures will be made available on OWL.

METHOD OF ASSESSMENT

10% - Participation

20% - Two tests on OWL, worth 10% each

50% - Two 1100 - 1300 word essays, worth 25% each*

20% - Final Exam on OWL, worth 20%

* Late papers will be assessed a 5% penalty for each day that they are late. No papers will be accepted after the last day of classes, i.e., Friday July 21st, 2023.

Prerequisite and Antirequisite Information

Students are responsible for ensuring that they have successfully completed all course prerequisites and that they have not completed any course antirequisites. Unless you have either the requisites for this course or written special permission from your Dean to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. Attendance Regulations for Examinations

All papers submitted for such checking will be included as source documents in the reference database for the purpose of detecting plagiarism of papers subsequently submitted to the system. Statement on Use of Electronic Devices

It is not appropriate to use electronic devices (such as, but not limited to, laptops, tablets, cell phones) in the classroom for non-classroom activities. Such activity is disruptive and distracting to other students and to the instructor, and can inhibit learning. Students are expected to respect the classroom environment and to refrain from inappropriate use of technology and other electronic devices in class.

Statement on Use of Personal Response Systems ("Clickers")

Personal Response Systems ("clickers") may be used in some classes. If clickers are to be used in a class, it is the responsibility of the student to ensure that the device is activated and functional. Students must see their instructor if they have any concerns about whether the clicker is malfunctioning. Students must use only their own clicker. If clicker records are used to compute a portion of the course grade:

- the use of somebody else's clicker in class constitutes a scholastic offence
- the possession of a clicker belonging to another student will be interpreted as an attempt to commit a scholastic offence.

Academic Consideration for Missed Work

All students pursuing academic consideration, regardless of type, must contact their instructors no less than 24 hours following the end of the period of absence to clarify how they will be expected to fulfill the academic responsibilities missed during their absence. **Students are reminded that they should consider carefully the implications of postponing tests or midterm exams or delaying submission of work, and are encouraged to make appropriate decisions based on their specific circumstances.**

Policy on Academic Consideration for a Medical/Non-Medical Absence

(a) Consideration on <u>Medical Grounds</u> for assignments worth *less than 10%* of final grade: Consult Instructor Directly and Contact Academic Advising

When seeking consideration on medical grounds for assignments worth less than 10% of the

final course grade, the student should contact the instructor directly. The student need only share broad outlines of the medical situation. The instructor **may** require the student to submit documentation to the academic advisors, in which case she or he will advise the student and inform the academic advisors to expect documentation. If documentation is requested, the student will need to complete and submit the <u>Student Medical Certificate</u>. The instructor may <u>not</u> collect medical documentation. The advisors will contact the instructor when the medical documentation is received, and will outline the severity and duration of the medical challenge as expressed on the Student Medical Certificate and in any other supporting documentation. The student will be informed that the instructor has been notified of the presence of medical documentation, and will be instructed to work as quickly as possible with the instructor on an agreement for accommodation.

b) <u>Medical Grounds</u> for assignments <u>worth 10% or more of final grade</u>: Go Directly to Academic Advising

University Senate policy, which can be found at <u>Academic Calendar - Western University</u> (<u>uwo.ca</u>) requires that all student requests for accommodation on medical grounds for assignments worth 10% or more of the final grade be made directly to the academic advising office of the home faculty (for Huron students, the "home faculty" is Huron), with supporting documentation in the form (minimally) of the Senate-approved Student Medical Certificate found at:

The documentation is submitted in confidence and will not be shown to instructors. The advisors will contact the instructor when the medical documentation is received, and will outline the severity and duration of the medical challenge as expressed on the Student Medical Certificate and in any other supporting documentation. The student will be informed that the instructor has been notified of the presence of medical documentation, and will be instructed to work as quickly as possible with the instructor on an agreement for accommodation. The instructor will not normally deny accommodation where appropriate medical documentation is in place and where the duration it describes aligns with the due date(s) of assignment(s). Before denying a request for accommodation on medical grounds, the instructor will consult with the Dean. The instructor's decision is appealable to the Dean.

<u>c)</u> Consideration on <u>Non-Medical</u> Grounds: Consult Huron Support Services/Academic Advising, or email <u>huronsss@uwo.ca</u>.

Students seeking academic consideration for a **non-medical** absence (e.g. varsity sports, religious, compassionate, or bereavement) will be required to provide appropriate documentation. All consideration requests must include a completed <u>Consideration Request</u> Form. Late penalties may apply at the discretion of the instructor.
