Course Description:

This course is an introduction to the philosophy of human rights, especially issues related to cultural diversity and moral relativism. We will begin our course with a survey of the historical development of the idea of human rights, from authors such as John Locke, Immanuel Kant, and Aristotle. We will then focus on some contemporary issues in the debates of human rights. For instance, are there a set of universal human rights or does the idea involve culture imperialism? Does the idea of minority group rights qualify as a human rights issue? Do we have a human right to make a livable wage, to security and healthcare? How do issues like abortion and euthanasia promote or undermine human rights? Do we have a right to meaningful social relationships? And finally, we will conclude the course by thinking about the status of animal rights.
