Course Description:

This course aims to develop student writing with a focus on the skills required for traditional academic forms. Working with assigned readings, students will practice incorporating new rhetorical and textual features into their own writing. Major assignments aim to develop the skills of summarizing, reviewing, citing and annotating. A focus on linguistic register will enable students to feel more confident expressing themselves in English academic writing. Online grammar exercises will enhance students' understanding of English grammar rules and their relationship to high quality academic writing. Through learning the conventions of copyright and the sanctions associated with plagiarism, students will develop and demonstrate in their work the principles and practices associated with academic integrity.
