## **Course Description:**

An introduction to the basic principles and techniques of good writing. The course will emphasize practical work and the development of writing skills for a variety of subjects and disciplines. Using an issues-based approach, Writing 2101F/G teaches students to synthesize higher order scholarly thinking with writing that appeals to diverse audiences and perspectives, thus fulfilling a mandate to bridge academic discourse with the community, while encouraging students to think creatively through challenging questions.

## **Learning Outcomes:**

Students will begin to understand the varying methods of producing expository writing, employing techniques such as process analysis, cause and effect analysis, definition, comparison, and classification.

Students will learn to distinguish their writing voices from the voices of others while forging a connection between the two that produces cohesive academic discourse.

Students will begin to recognize and make use of various stylistic strategies to produce different effects on their reading audiences.

Students will identify the ways in which writing within and across academic disciplines produces empowering and enlightening ways of thinking about social issues, community engagement, and contemporary cultures.
