
launched new strategic direction for Huron, outlining four goals that illuminate who Huron is, what matters, and where the university is heading:

Huron welcomed largest first-year class in its **155-year history**, 432 full-time first year students, including increase of 10% in students with 95%+ average.

New positions were added to support the student experience and student success in areas including wellness, student life, career services and community partnerships.

Introduced new major in Global Rights Studies and a new minor in Chinese Business Communications.

The Faculty of Theology introduced Major and Minor modules in Religion and Theology within the Bachelor of Arts program, allowing students to combine studies in Religion and Theology with another BA program at Huron or Western.

CAREER MAPPING AND NAVIGATING POSSIBILITIES

Huron's Career Development team has been working one-on-one with students to plan intentional volunteer and internship experiences, relevant to the industry students want to work in post-graduation.

Located in the Student Support Services area of the West Wing. Academic Advising and Career Development Services are now situated in one convenient location.

MENTORSHIP PROGRAM – CONNECTING STUDENTS

Huron launched a tri-mentorship program to encourage career and academic mentorship between students, recent graduates, and senior alumni. Developed to foster and connect *Leaders with Heart*.

CURL (The Centre for Undergraduate Research Learning) awarded 8 Research Fellowships valued at \$1,500 each, on topics such as the economic experiences of refugees in Canada and the differences between Canadian and Nordic teachers' conceptions of creativity and early childhood teaching models.

An Institutional Grant from the SSHRC

allowed us to fund student-faculty research collaborations in the form of paid research assistantships for four faculty research projects in the fields of Psychology, History, English, and French. YEAR IN

Huron Foundation

The purpose of the Huron Foundation is to receive, invest and manage endowment funds in order to assist Huron in attracting students and maintaining its standing as a first-class liberal arts and theological university.



INVESTMENT RESULTS

The Foundation's investments were \$19,758,862 as of December 31, 2018. In comparison, the investment portfolio stood at \$21,107,585 at the start of 2018. The significant decrease is due to the market declines in late 2018. We are pleased to note the market value of investments at March 31, 2019 had increased to \$21,259,419.

Our Investment Committee and Board are in the process of reviewing our investment policies and asset mixes so as to be confident that there is an appropriate balance between risk and reward.


PAYOUT


The Foundation reviews the amount of the yearly grant to Huron annually to fulfill the Foundation's duty to manage endowed assets in a responsible manner. The Trustees take into account various factors including forecasts for longer term returns from capital markets. The intent is to mute the effect of market volatility on the portfolio and the level of grant. The Foundation has to balance the needs of Huron with whether future longer-term capital market returns will be sufficient to more than cover this annual payout. The 2018 grant to Huron was \$1,146,652.


