# **Course Description**

An introduction to the writing system and grammar of Biblical Hebrew for those with no previous knowledge of the language.

According to an ancient Jewish legend, the Creator spoke the world into existence using the language of Hebrew. With this course, students will begin to learn this sacred language of the Jewish religion, the language in which the majority of the Bible (both Jewish and Christian) was written and which was revived in the twentieth century in the form of Modern Hebrew. To encourage the daily discipline of study and practice that is necessary for language learning, the grading scheme of this course is weighted more evenly throughout the term, with regular homework assignments and quizzes carrying the bulk of the grade. Your commitment is necessary to achieve the goals of this course, which are to develop skills both for reading fluency and basic oral competence with biblical Hebrew; to develop a vocabulary of frequently occurring words in the Hebrew Bible; and to encounter biblical Hebrew as part of a living culture.

## **Course Outcomes**

For the best possible outcome, this course should be regarded as the first of two 3-unit courses, upon the successful completion of which a student should be able to:

- pronounce with confidence the text of the Hebrew Bible
- read basic Biblical Hebrew prose
- articulate the value of reading the text in its original language

Assignments and Participation 26%
